TRIPS AND ACTIVITIES

ANIMAL SCIENCE TRIP TO CRUFTS

Thirty of our Animal Science students visited Crufts. The highlight of the trip was the rescue dog agility course, and the commentator told the students about where the dogs had been rescued from. Misha Williams said she enjoyed the single heats agility, and Hayden Marshall said it was really good fun, especially the fly ball which is when there are two teams of dogs competing against each other for the fastest time.

HEALTH AND SOCIAL TRIP TO NORWICH THEATRE ROYAL

On March 10th, Health and Social Care Level 2 students went to see the critically acclaimed George Orwell Animal Farm at Norwich Theatre Royal. They really enjoyed the performance, and they appreciated the creativity and hard work as well as the representation of social constructs, and how we could link this to current affairs in the world.

ECC SUPPORTING OUR COMMUNITY



The GoodforME GoodforFE campaign has reached it's initial target of capturing £1m social value! East Coast College have contributed a large number towards this amount, as can be seen below;

The totals are:

Academic year 2021/22 to date -

5976.5 social action hours

6651 items donated to food/baby banks

Term two -

£1843.56 fundraised

Performing Arts and Music students put on performances asking for foodbank donations in place of selling tickets – 549 social action hours and 300 items donated

The Performing Arts students put on performances in support of local foodbanks in the run-up to Christmas, where finances can be difficult for many, particularly post-pandemic. The idea of donations instead of tickets was student-led, which gave them an opportunity to think about how their actions can benefit others. A great way of translating something fun (to take part in and to watch) into a way to support the local community.

Welding students made and auctioned off a log burner for charity – 120 social action hours and £1000 raised

The Welding students raised funds for local wildlife charities chosen by the group as a way of supporting a member of the team who had recently lost a pet. This project allowed them to work as a team, support each other and build something truly unique while fundraising.

Card making for a local resident celebrate their 100th birthday – 43.5 social action hours

Over 30 cards were sent by our Travel and Tourism students, and this allowed the recipient to feel valued on their milestone birthday. This example shows that fundraising does not always have to be present in social action but that time is a valuable resource we can also donate.

Filming and editing videos for a local charity – 258 social action hours

Working with Freshly Grated to support their work around involving local young people in creative arts and media. This allowed the students involved to utilise the college's resources and equipment to support the production of something which would otherwise have cost the charity money to produce themselves. This allowed their financial resources to be used in direct work with young people.



BENEFITS OF WORK EXPERIENCE

There are many benefits to work experience or industry placements

- The opportunity for students to gain an understanding of a real work environment and what is expected of them within their chosen industry.
- An edge in the employability stakes showing motivation to develop and learn new things.
- A valuable addition to a CV that makes an industry relevant discussion point at job interviews. The experience gained often leads to an employment offer as time spent with the employer shows that the student has what they are looking for in a full time employee.

TO SEXUAL HARASSMENT, DISCRIMINATION AND VIOLENCE UPDATE

Some terms you may hear...

Below, we are sharing some terminology you may have heard, which your child has learnt about in college. This is part of ensuring their safety. If you are concerned about any aspect of your child's safety please contact the Wellbeing team using the details below.

What is Criminal Exploitation?

When people are manipulated, threatened or coerced into being involved in criminal activity. Examples include stealing, moving and selling drugs or stolen property, or acting as 'look outs' for others.

What are County Lines?

When gangs from cities move drugs into rural areas and coastal towns, typically using young or vulnerable people to carry, store or sell the drugs.

What is Human Trafficking and Modern Slavery?

When people of any age, gender, nationality and ethnicity are moved around with a view to exploit them or are forced to do things they do not want to do, including having to engage in sexual activity they do not want to, or being moved from one area to another. This also includes working without getting paid or being able to keep the money they earn. Some of the industries commonly associated with these issues include but are not limited to; hospitality, construction, manufacturing, care, car washes, agriculture, and nail bars.

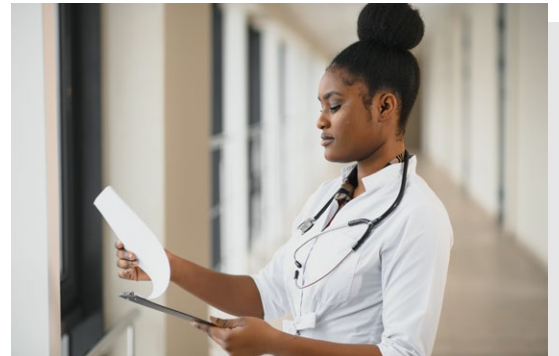
