

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CHILDCARE NEW ZEALAND TRIP



Thirteen Childcare students from our Level One, Level Two and T Level courses from the Lowestoft and Great Yarmouth campuses embarked on a 14-day educational trip of a lifetime to New Zealand to explore the Te Whāriki approach to early childhood thanks to the Turing Scheme.

In their first week students visited Auckland University and had a lecture from Professor Marek Tesar about the Te Whāriki early years curriculum. Students were introduced to the main ideas that children are 'competent and confident learners and communicators.' It encourages children to be proud of their ancestors and focuses on four principles: empowerment, holistic development, family, community and relationships.

All students were presented with a copy of the curriculum and then were given a tour of the campus. Charlie Frith was particularly interested in the learning stories that were written to the children. After this, students visited St Eden, the tallest volcano in Auckland.





CHILDCARE NEW ZEALAND TRIP





Students went to Kirikiri kindergarten. They were called in with a traditional Māori welcome. The children greeted our students with a pōwhiri and a waiata, which are traditional greetings. Our Turing group sang back and then enjoyed a Kai with the children (food). This symbolised manaakitanga, which is a way of expressing and nurturing relationships, and engaging with one another. This moved the group to a state of noa, which means they now belong.

Our students learnt more about the philosophy that underpins the curriculum and were impressed with the way the children are given choices and learn through exploring and discovery learning.

In their downtime, the Turing group explored a waterfall and learnt to cook and clean together. Students helped create a weekly menu and all took a turn to help with the cooking and cleaning.



Students visited the site where the Waitangi treaty was signed between the Māori and the British Crown in 1840. This had a big impact on the early year's curriculum, physical spaces and bicultural curriculum.

Our students had an opportunity to witness a Māori traditional ceremony with singing, dancing and pukana which is used to intimidate and challenge! The group even had a go!







CHILDCARE NEW ZEALAND TRIP

Students explored the North Island, making the most of the rainy weather and exploring the geothermal bubbling mud pools and geezers at Te Puia Geothermal Park. Students were amazed at the heat of the steam and loved it when the geezer shot it into the air.

The group found out about Māori traditional crafts and watched wood and bone carving as well as weaving using traditional tools to keep the Māori culture alive.

They also saw the rare kiwi bird in its enclosure which was quite a feat as they are nocturnal and found out about their breeding programme.

There are about 70,000 left in New Zealand making them very endangered, which means the breeding program they witnessed was even more special.

Students visited the last nursery setting Tutarawananga Kohanga Reo. This was a school
entirely for Mauri children. They enjoyed a
traditional whakatau with singing and speeches.
The group's nominated chief, Ethan, gave thanks for
thewelcome and they sat down for a traditional kai.
The groups said thefried bread was amazing!

After this, they visited another amazing volcanic beach. Students dug their own holes and hot rocks from magma heat this up!





Our Childcare New Zealand students returned home from their life-changing trip. During their last couple of days, they explored the local area and did an All Blacks rugby experience where students witnessed the haka. It was an amazing trip full of laughter, friendships and memories that will last a lifetime.


EAST ANGLIAN AIR AMBULANCE




WINTER WONDERLAND

This visit will help with practical ideas for their events units. Seeing the set-up and management of a large-scale event helps to put theory into practice.




SUPPORTED INTERNSHIP APOLLO PROJECT

A LEVEL HISTORY POLAND TRIP





Our sixth form A Level History students enjoyed a trip to Krakow, Poland to broaden their understanding of the country's history. They began their trip by visiting Auschwitz and Birkenhau museum. It was a sombre day for the students as they tried to comprehend the events that took place.



Students then visited the Schindler Museum where they discovered what life under the Nazi occupation of Krakow was like. This was a very insightful experience for the students following their Auschwitz visit that morning.

In the evening students enjoyed some free time exploring Krakow and enjoying the tastes and sounds of the city centre. Traditional Polish dishes, including Placki Ziemniaczane, Borscht and Pierogi, were enjoyed by all.





After students checked out of their hotel, they began a tour of the Wieliczka salt mines which involved an 800-step descent, 130m below ground! The descent was well worth seeing the salt sculptures, caverns and underground cathedrals.

University

This is our busiest time of year for all things UCAS and University application-related, at the time of writing the Careers team is busy supporting with last-minute applications, personal statements, and course choices. We have hosted multiple sessions from local and national universities across all our campus. By the time you are reading this newsletter, the deadline will have passed and we will be moving into student budgeting and student finance applications in March. If your young person has yet to make an application and decides they want to, the option of university remains on the table until September/October 2024 so we are happy to support students with late applications and through the clearing process.



Apprenticeship Fair - 8th February

Apprenticeships continue to be a big part of our discussions and work with students, we know how popular this is an option but also aware that demand continues to outstrip demand. Our mission is to raise awareness of opportunities but also make sure students understand what might be required to source and secure an apprenticeship opportunity. On 8th February we were joined by over 20 employers and apprenticeship providers including the NHS, Sizewell, BBC, Tesla and, Aviva as well as other local employers and some of our training staff.

Higher Education Fair

On 28th March we are hosting a Higher Education Fair at the Lowestoft Campus (transport provided from Great Yarmouth) which is aimed at year 12 students primarily. We will be joined by over 25 universities and higher and degree apprenticeship providers between 10am and 7pm. In the evening parents and carers are welcome to attend and speak to universities, we will also be running information sessions throughout the day and evening on the student experience, gap years and student finance. We know that the idea of university can come with big questions and consideration and are making this event open to parents and carers of students are welcome to book in and attend the evening session where we will have Student Finance England giving a presentation and opening the floor for a Q&A session. WELDING EMPLOYER VISIT

Welding students visited Alicat Work Boats Marine designers and builders of high-speed aluminium catamarans in two separate groups. Both groups had similar experiences, the first group witnessed one vessel being lifted from the dock using the mobile hoist manoeuvres within the dry dock and placed in the yard for repairs.

They were able to board the 'North Star' Hybrid Daughter Craft which was being prepped for an interior fit-out and electrical installation. A great opportunity to view close up the beginnings of her keel, her frames and stringers and the internal and external Tacks and Welds. They were shown the plans, templates and processes and were witness to the work of engineers, welders and fabricators. Both groups boarded another vessel fitted out but having alternations involving welding and fabrication.


They all agreed that comradery and teamwork is key to the success of each project, an exciting setting with a multi-skilled workforce. The students walked around the boat yard in the rain for two hours on the second visit, an ample opportunity for students gain a real understanding of the working environment.

3D WORKSHOP

Level 3 Art and Design students took part in a 3D workshop with local artist Tricia Hall. The workshop fed nicely into their current project with a real focus on play, process and materials. We also discussed waste materials and using found objects, touching on sustainability and posing questions around thier own creative practice. Students very quickly painted offcuts of wood and then, working in an intuitive manner, began connecting them one by one, allowing ideas to change along the way whilst matching colour and shape. The outcomes were a mass of colour, line and shape, compositions that played with space and weight and a series of small structures that were fantastic examples of ideas and creative thinking.

SIZEWELL VISIT



SAFER INTERNET DAY


